MARACAS



Maracas are musical instruments that are played by being shaken. They are usually made of a gourd shaped container filled with dried objects. The maracas are believed to be inventions of the Taíno people, the indigenous people of Puerto Rico. They were originally made from the round fig fruit of the Higuera tree.

Making maracas is a great craft project for children of all ages to enjoy.

A maraca player in Spanish is called a maraquero.

Make homemade maracas by using corn kernels, plastic eggs and spoons.

After making your maracas, go to the stage area and help the dancers by keeping the beat with your maracas!

Celebrate Earth Day by planting sunflower seeds:

- ➤ To make sunflower sprouts, fill your biodegradable pot with soil, then place the raw seed on the surface and cover lightly with ¼" soil.
- Place the pot in an area of full sunlight.
- > Water the seeds one or two times a day until the germination occurs (usually within 7 to 10 days)
- Sunflowers grow very large and will need to be transplanted to bigger and bigger containers or to an outside garden.





BLUE EYE / EVIL EYE (Göz / Nazar Boncuğu)



It is a Turkish folk belief that jealous and envious looks from others have the power to cause misfortune to a person. Turkish people believe that this amulet protects its holder from those bad energies by absorbing them.

A typical nazar boncuğu (amulet) is made of handmade glass featuring concentric circles or teardrop shapes in dark blue, white, yellow, light blue and black, occasionally with a yellow/gold edge. According to Turkish belief, blue acts as a shield against evil and absorbs negativity. This tradition is common in the Middle East, the Mediterranean, and India and so ancient that even the Assyrians made turquoise and blue-eye amulets thousands of years ago.

KİLİM

Kilim, a word of Turkish origin, denotes a pileless rug produced by one of several flat weaving techniques that have a common heritage and are practiced in the geographical area that includes parts of Türkiye (Anatolia and Thrace), North Africa, the Balkans, the Caucasus, Iran, Afghanistan, Pakistan, Central Asia and China.


Hands on Hips











Ram's Hom







This motif is used as a symbol of fertility, heroism, power, and masculinity.

Fertility











The fertility pattern is composed of two 'Hands on Hips' motifs indicating the female, and two 'Ram's Horn' motifs indicating the male.

Wolf's Mouth / Wolf's Paw









Many ancient Anatolians were shepherds and cattle breeders, and these motifs are used to express solidarity and to protect against attacks from wolves.


Love and Unity / Yin-Yang











Hair Band











Anatolian women express many of their feelings with their hair style. Newly married women braid their hair and tie threads of different colors at the end of each braid.

Dragon







The Turks of Central Asia stylized the dragon with a beak, wings, and a lion's feet. The dragon is the master of air and water. The fight of the dragon and the Phoenix is believed to bring fertile rains of spring.

Star







The star motif on an Anatolian weaving generally means happiness. The use of these six-pointed stars goes back to the ancient Phrygians and predates Solomon's Star.
